CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The curriculum, admissions and evaluation process of the college are as per the norms of the Bharathidasan University. The institution has an effective curriculum delivery mechanism through all its UG, PG, Ph.D. and Certificate programmes. The curriculum of the UG programme consists of five parts. All the programmes are under choice based credit system (CBCS). The college is committed to provide the best quality of education to the students. Our college students and teaching faculty has been registered for MOOC (SWAYAM and National Programme On Technology Enhanced Learning NPTEL) where they access e-learning through online Web and Video courses for various streams. In order to inculcate moral values, Mentor -Mentee system is conducted to all the students. The placement cell also plays a vital role in imparting knowledge and to upgrade themselves to higher career opportunities. NET/SET coaching classes are also

organized for PG students. Aptitude related training programs are also conducted to equip the final year students to meet their interviews. The academic activities and extracurricular activities of the college includes maintaining high academic standards to provide appropriate knowledge and skills to the students to meet the fast changing needs of the society, making the students encompassed new technologies and compete at the national level. To ensure the effective delivery of curriculum, the institution has taken the following processes: Academic Calendar mentions the number of working days, the list of holidays, and the scheduled dates of Examination. Time Table is drafted and finalized well ahead of the commencement of classes. It shows the number of theory classes, and practical classes, allotted to each department. Library hours have been allotted for all the other academic programmes. Attendance register for the students have been prepared to make daily record and SMS facility is extended to all the parents through computerization system. The college library provides ample number of books, journals, magazines and e-learning sources such as INFLIBNET (N-LIST), DOAJ, DELNET, DSPACE (Digital Library software), Project Madurai (Tamil sources), Shodhganga, Shodhsindhu and Urkund. The E-learning resources such as moodle, coursera, Khan academy, Teacher tube, School tube and other e-resources are also available in our campus. The above mentioned sources enable the teachers to ensure the active delivery of curriculum and in turn benefit the students too. Our college students and teaching faculty have registered for SWAYAM and NPTEL Well-equipped laboratories and updated library, innovative teaching methods like ICT enabled teaching facilities (SMART BOARD) and INTERACTIVE BOARD facilities have been extended for the enhancement of student's knowledge. HOD's Meetings are held frequently with the principal to disseminate the information regarding the academic activities, in turn the Head of the department discuss their action plans to the staff members. As per the norms of Bharathidasan University, Examination Schedule is followed and informed to all the departments and students about the same. The college has the motto to enthuse and elevate students to greater heights of life. The goal and objectives of the college are well defined and meticulously pursued.

Yes through Tutor ward presently Mentor Mentee system The college has since last several years practised a system of mentoring called the Tutorward system, whereby a tutor was provided to every ward to look after her academic and psychological wellbeing and also monitor class attendance and performance. The same system has now been restructured and named Mentor system. Under the Mentor system, the fulltime teachers of the college have been engaged as mentors of each class. The mentors are responsible for academic progress and psychological wellbeing of their mentees. They are also entrusted with the task of monitoring the attendance and academic progress of the students. They also provide primary psychological counselling to those who need them and refer them for more professional counselling, if required. At the beginning of the academic session, the mentors conduct orientation programmes for the mentees, whereby they are acquainted with the institution, its goals and mission. The mentors maintain the biographic details of each individual mentee including educational background and socioeconomic status. The mentor system exists as a robust informal mechanism to boost inclusiveness and social responsibility of students.

Effective Teaching and Learning process is evaluated through a proper assessment of student's performance. Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system is efficiently evaluated at the institutional level. The institute adopts various practices to measure the internal academic performance of the students. The assessment is done for a score of 25marks by compiling the scores secured by the students in unit tests, model examination and performance based improvement tests. The extra performance of the student's participation in seminars and presentations of assignments is also included to summate their internal scores. The CIE exam dates are predetermined and listed in the college calendar. ? Result Analysis Review Meeting Result Analysis is done by the class tutors after every CIE Test. The institution is keen on monitoring the performance of the students and reports to the Parents. Progress Reports are sent by the tutors to the parents after each test. Parents/ Guardians are advised to note the performance of their wards and take remedial measure if needed. Remedial Classes are conducted for the slow learners, absentees and the students who participate in extracurricular activities and association clubs. This practice helps struggling learners to update their subject knowledge and helps them to catch up with their peers. Supplementary Examinations are held for the final year students who have appeared and failed in any one of the semester theory papers relating to completion of her degree.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE. An academic calendar is prepared carefully by the senior staff of the college in consultation with the Management and Principal for the conduction of Continuous Internal Evaluation. The Principal of the college convenes meetings for all the heads of the departments and plan for the conduction of internal exams before each internal exam. The decision made in the HOD's meeting is strictly implemented by the college. The Academic calendar is prepared for postgraduate as well as undergraduate courses and it mainly displays the commencement of instructional activity, internal test schedule, Technical Events, sports activities, tentative schedule of Unit test, Mid and Model semester examination, and other related college activities. Academic calendar is an important tool for various teaching learning process.
